Absentee ballots 2019

E very year, Sheridan Electric Cooperative has trustee elections as three-year terms expire. Although trustees can be nominated for additional terms, other candidates can also run for the positions.

One component of this process is the absentee ballot process. In this process, a member of Sheridan Electric can vote by proxy if they cannot be present at the scheduled annual meeting.

The process is simple, but has to be requested by the member when needed. Below is the section from the Sheridan Electric bylaws that describes the process.

"Absentee ballots for elections of officers are available upon request. Absentee ballots will only be issued upon request of a member. Ballots will be mailed to the member no more than 45 days nor less than 15 days before the annual meeting of the members. Absentee ballots must arrive at the cooperative offices no later than five (5) days before the annual meeting of the members."

We encourage any member of Sheridan Electric Cooperative to use this feature for voting by proxy. Just give Tasha or Jamie a call at 406-789-2231.

District Nominating Committee report

E very year, you have the opportunity to vote for three directors at the annual meeting. The directors serve for a three-year term. The directors whose terms expire this year are in District 2 (this includes the area in and around Westby), District 3 (all areas in North Dakota), and District 5 (area from Bainville to Culbertson and north to the Sheridan County line).

Sheridan Electric Cooperative uses several steps to help members get on the ballot. First, we appoint a Nominating Committee. This committee is made up of members in each district who are your neighbors. These committee members then hold a meeting and nominate who they think would be good board members. These nominations then appear on the printed ballot at the annual meeting. This year, all of the incumbents were nominated.

In District 2, incumbent Jody Lagerquist was nominated. In District 3, incumbent Rob Rust was nominated. In District 5, Rick Hansen was nominated. There were no further nominations.

We want to thank the district Nominating Committee for assuming the responsibility of nominating these candidates. Finding members with the time to serve on the board is difficult. We hope to see you, the members, at the annual meeting Oct. 12 so you can vote on these candidates. ■

Cooperative education project goes into full swing

September will be a full month in regards to school presentations. Sheridan Electric Cooperative has been working on a cooperative education project to teach young folks (sixth-, seventh- and eighth-graders) about cooperative history, past, present and future. Having done pilot projects at the Westby school and in Medicine Lake, we have fine-tuned this project to meet with all 10 schools in September.

The project was born out of necessity, as we learned that most students don't know what a cooperative is or about the cooperative business model. Targeting the sixth-, seventh- and eighth-graders, we will do this annually so the sixth-graders will receive the training three times before they graduate. We have dubbed this endeavor as a 10-year plan. It is also part of the strategy to target these age groups, because in 10 years, they will be 19-, 20- and 21-year-old members who will understand what cooperatives are all about in this region.

Now to take the project even further, we will have a scavenger hunt at the annual meeting in October. This will consist of students attending the meeting, and meeting the employees and board members. Each employee and board member will have tokens with their names on them to be given out. This will also consist of defining, in an essay, what the manager's report meant to them and the message he was sharing.

Keep in mind that this is a group effort from a school for the best representation at the meeting. The best school representation and participation, and tokens collected, will receive a check from the cooperative as a donation.

The message is clear. We care about the future of cooperatives in this region. We care about who our next board members, CEOs, office managers and accountants will be, and we care about answering the issues that haunt all cooperatives – dwindling participation in the business model and member engagement.

We are taking all of this seriously. Wish us luck. Please encourage all students to attend, whether they saw the presentation or not, and let's continue to believe in the cooperative way.
